

Possibility Seeds is a Canadian social change consultancy dedicated to gender justice and equity. With Possibility Seeds, Farrah works to nourish gender justice, equity, and inclusion for communities and institutions.

Jennifer Flood (Education Lead, Possibility Seeds) is a queer mixed Métis Indigenous woman with English and Irish settler ancestry, residing in Tkaranto. For nearly a decade, she has led gender-based violence/sexual violence prevention education initiatives at post-secondary institutions including Humber College and the University of Toronto. She makes space for those living at the intersections of 2SQTBIPOC identities, and centres trauma-informed and culturally-grounded practices.
